YOUTH MENTAL HEALTH

At the end of 2021, the <u>American Academy of Pediatrics</u> declared a nationwide state of emergency for youth mental health. Of the youth in Wyoming who have diagnosable mental health conditions, only 33% of those receive professional care.

Neither proximity nor financial resources should stand between children and the care they need.

Join us in ensuring that hurdles are eliminated through programs like telehealth, expanded community-based care, increased availability of Medicaid supports, provider rates commensurate with the services they provide, and attracting talented individuals to join the caregiving + healthcare field.

IT'S TIME TO PRIORITIZE WYOMING YOUTH

We join providers and advocates nationwide in sounding the alarm for kids.

We urge immediate action to address funding solutions that address the crisis in youth mental health.

Funds will ensure the expansion of the care continuum and accelerate a broader range of available mental health services to youth and families in Wyoming. From community prevention to crisis services, residential care, and outpatient therapies, we'll strengthen and transform our health system by partnering with youth & families through compassionate, accessible care.



FUNDING PRIORITIES



01 – health and human services workforce

Increased provider rates through the Wyoming Department of Family Services and Wyoming Department of Health will strengthen the workforce that supports youth and families statewide. Through wage increases, training, loan forgiveness, and an expansion of the care opportunities available, we'll support the basic needs of Wyoming kids and families.



02 - youth programs and services

Wyoming has the opportunity to significantly impact mental health through use of ARPA funds. Children and youth make up 30% of Wyoming's population and 1/3 of available funds should be utilized to build a system of care that prioritizes their wellness.



03 — telehealth and outpatient care

Let's invest in expanding the availability of telehealth (counseling, coaching, mentoring, clinical therapy, and more) to strengthen our Wyoming network of providers, ensure provider rates are in place, and improve provision of care to youth living in rural areas.

We call on lawmakers to *invest* in youth & families.

ISSUE	OPPORTUNITY + OUTCOME
Medicaid Expansion	25,000 additional Wyoming kids and families eligible to receive healthcare services like primary and specialty medical care, counseling, and crisis services
Care Provider Increases	Support an increased appropriation to the DFS budget for service providers that ensures access to care, emergency shelter, and treatment for 5,000 youth statewide
Human Services ARPA allocation	Wyoming will receive \$1.68 billion dollars from the American Rescue Plan. Let's call on lawmakers to infuse that money into services that help the people of our state.
